A permanent bathroom is proposed for the Tiger Creek whitewater put-in. This should also be considered for other high use recreation areas and facilities.	Brian Oneto, District 5 Supervisor	No	Site observations did not identify other areas that needed permanent restrooms, as high use areas already have permanent restrooms (e.g., Lake Tabaud day use area, Electra whitewater put-in and day use area, Tiger Creek Afterbay). The Tiger Creek whitewater boating put-in site was the only site with a portable toilet, which is being vandalized (knocked over). The Stewardship Council recommended adding a permanent facility to avoid such vandalism. The feasibility and value of this recommended potential measure, including modifications or additions, will be further evaluated in the disposition process (Volume III).
How do you intend to support the Mokelumne Ecological Resource Committee? If it is through funding wouldn't it be better spend the funds elsewhere, where they would provide greater public benefit?	Brian Oneto, District 5 Supervisor	No	Support of the Mokelumne Ecological Resource Committee to enhance aquatic habitat is not envisioned as financial support, but rather as the granting of access or other needed permissions necessary to physically enhance East and West Panther Creeks through ongoing restoration efforts related to the removal of the East and West Panther Creek Diversion Dams.

As per the Settlement Agreement and Stipulation, the conservation easements must honor existing environmental and economic uses on the Watershed Lands. The Stewardship Council has developed potential measures to enhance agricultural uses at the North Fork Mokelumne River Planning Unit, including developing a baseline conditions report and a rangeland management plan. Should these potential measures be implemented, coordination with grazing lessees is expected to occur. Conservation easements, including the overall objectives of management plans, will be developed during the disposition process. Specifics of management plans will likely be developed post transaction. There will be opportunities for the public and stakeholders to engage with the Stewardship Council and other stakeholders on this topic as well as other topics related to the disposition and future management and stewardship of the lands. The Stewardship Council will provide public notice and encourage participation in meetings, workshops, and other appropriate methods of participation in the planning process.</p>
<p>Outdoor Recreation, Standard Canal Trail, not clear where Standard Canal trail is located. If put where proposed will border our private property on the Mokelumne River. We are concerned about trespassing, liability, fire, garbage, camping, fences and riparian areas. If put along the Mokelumne River trail must stay within the high water mark plus 10 feet or be on some private property. If put in another location same concerns apply. Also any walking or bike trails proposal.</p>	<p>Jimmie Cuneo</p>	<p>No</p>	<p>Comment noted. The Stewardship Council developed a potential measure to support future efforts to restore the historic Standard Canal Trail, but the description of the trail measure in the Supporting Analysis for the Recommendations also states that "an analysis would need to be conducted by the entity organizing this effort to determine the safety and feasibility of reopening this trail, as it could expose sensitive operational features and adjacent properties to potential vandalism as well as create difficult fire management conditions." The Stewardship Council understands that illegal uses, such as the ones described in the comment, are an issue at several locations throughout this planning unit. In regard to illegal activities and security, the Stewardship Council has developed a potential measure to: "Identify and disclose unauthorized uses and develop strategies to address future management and/or eradication."</p>
