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<p>Page 2, paragraph one, line 4, pleased to see the intent to honor existing agreements for economic uses.</p> <p>Page 2, paragraph 3, line 9, pleased to see the recognition that some of the proposed measure may be deleted as more information is acquired.</p> <p>Page 9 last paragraph, line 11, "...conservation easements to protect any cultural resources..."</p> <p>Suggest adding the modifier "significant" between "any" and "cultural" to be consistent with the language used throughout the LCP.</p> <p>The phrasing at present is too broad and does not allow for reasonable judgment to be used.</p>	Frank Ryan	No	Comment noted. The Stewardship Council has used this somewhat standard ("Incorporate cultural resource protection measures in conservation easements to protect any cultural resources found in the future in coordination with Native American entities") to allow for the fact that there is little, if any, information regarding cultural resources on Watershed Lands outside the FERC boundaries; as well as on FERC-related lands under licenses that have not gone through relicensing in the recent past. Which measures get carried forward into implementation will be determined during the disposition process. There will be opportunities for the public and stakeholders to engage with the Stewardship Council and other stakeholders on this topic as well as other topics related to the disposition and future management and stewardship of the lands. <p>Page 8, line 7, Any studies involving the Hat Creek Rifle and Pistol Club should be closely coordinated with the Club as well as any other potentially affected parties. Great care must be taken to assess the real and on going cultural values and the extent of any real and significant impacts on neighboring properties or activities.</p>	Frank Ryan	Yes	Text has been added to the main Volume II and to the Supporting Analysis for Recommendations regarding the potential measure to determine noise impacts from the club. Added text states that the proposed measure should be coordinated with the club and any other potentially affected parties.
Previous reference to Page 9, last paragraph, line 11 should read line 10.	Frank Ryan	No	Comment noted.
<p>This concern the Supporting Analysis for Recommendations.</p> <p>Page 2, Potential Measure: Require regular clean up of debris at the Hat Creek Rifle and Pistol Club, line 2, We are very pleased the recognition of the popularity of the Club and the high volume of use it gets. Qualified donees will be determined during the early stages of developing the Disposition Packages (Volume III's). The Stewardship Council will provide public notice and encourage participation in meetings, workshops, and other appropriate methods of participation in the planning process.
In 1952, the Fall River Lions Club built, and has since maintained for the free use of the general public, a small park on the banks of the Pit River just downstream from the Pit One Powerhouse.
