<p>CONDUCT SURVEYS TO IDENTIFY BIOLOGICAL RESOURCES AND ENABLE THEIR PROTECTION Please include ethnographic surveys to evaluate status traditional use plants and planning for their habitat enhancement. Please include a wetland conservation plan for lacustrine and palustrine wetlands. Tribal wetland conservation planning funding can provide funding for survey, design of protection measures, and ultimate habitat enhancement. The Tribe also requests that coldwater habitat and the fishery be considered in the survey and enhancement of the planning unit.</p>	Pit River Tribe	Yes	<p>The Stewardship Council has proposed an ethnographic study of the planning unit to identify traditional use areas, which would include ethnobotanical sites. Text has been added to the Supporting Analysis for Recommendations description of biological resource surveying to include traditional use plants. Planning for both traditional use plant and wetland protection and enhancement would be addressed under the potential measure to develop a wildlife and habitat management plan. Conservation easements, including the overall objectives of management plans, will be developed during the disposition process. Specifics of management plans will likely be developed post transaction. Enhancements to fishery habitat are outside the purview of the Stewardship Council.</p>
<p>ASSESS POTENTIAL FOR RESTORATION IN CINDER FLATS In the event of this parcel's contribution to non-point source pollutants, the Stewardship Council may want to coordinate with the Tribes Clean Water Act 319 programs which can provide funding for survey, design, and restoration.</p>	Pit River Tribe	No	Comment noted.

If any land parcels are transferred to the Tribe, then they could be put into Trust and be eligible for funding through the Bureau of Indian Affairs. <p>INSTALL INTERPRETIVE SIGNAGE REGARDING WILDLIFE AND NATIVE SPECIES AT CRYSTAL LAKE, BAUM LAKE, AND ALONG THE PACIFIC CREST TRAIL Since many of these unique and special areas were historically utilized by the Astuge and Illmawi bands of the Pit River Tribe, we request that the traditional use of the area be noted in the discussion of the special status species, habitat, etc.</p>	Pit River Tribe	Yes	The signage measure has been changed to include traditional use at Crystal Lake, Baum Lake, and along the Pacific Crest Trail. In addition, appropriate text has been added to the related text within the Supporting Analysis for Recommendations.
<p>SUSTAINABLE FORESTRY Any lands transferred to the Tribe and put into Trust immediately qualify for Forest Management Planning funds. Once Planning is complete, these lands become eligible for sustainable forest management funding to implement projects that promote holistic watershed management. Tribal Forest Management Plans are updated with the Bureau of Indian Affairs every 5 years.</p>	Pit River Tribe	No	Comment noted. The Stewardship Council appreciates the Tribe's interest in cost-share funding to assist with implementation of future forest management. The Stewardship Council has adopted a definition of sustainable forestry that will guide the development of forest management plans as appropriate. The Stewardship Council is developing an explicit set of criteria that will be used to determine which potential donees are qualified to participate in the disposition process. Qualified donees will be determined during the early stages of developing the Disposition Packages (Volume III's).
